If we receive no response, we will fully understand. The utter elation we would feel were we to find a reply in our letterbox goes without saying.



Your Royal Highness, hereafter follows our ideal scenario for a performance entitled 'Leaving the Public' in which you play the leading role.

Your Royal Highness is administered a sleeping pill and proceeds to lie on a bed in a sober room. Prior to this, ten people have gathered and are seated around the bed. Your Royal Highness is not announced by name, whereby the public remains in a state of uncertainty. Nothing is said. In silence the observers patiently wait until Your Royal Highness falls asleep. By falling asleep, Your Royal Highness relinquishes her public duties. In front of an audience, you depart the (royal) architecture of your image, you leave the public space created by the presence of an audience. Each observer decides individually when that time has come, to then likewise leave the space through a back door. The sleeping body of Your Highness is a shell to protect an intimacy with which the public has no business. The sleeping pill is an artistic instrument: like the painter's brush, it creates a much-needed distance between the representation and the observer. It serves as a night watch, as a bodyguard.

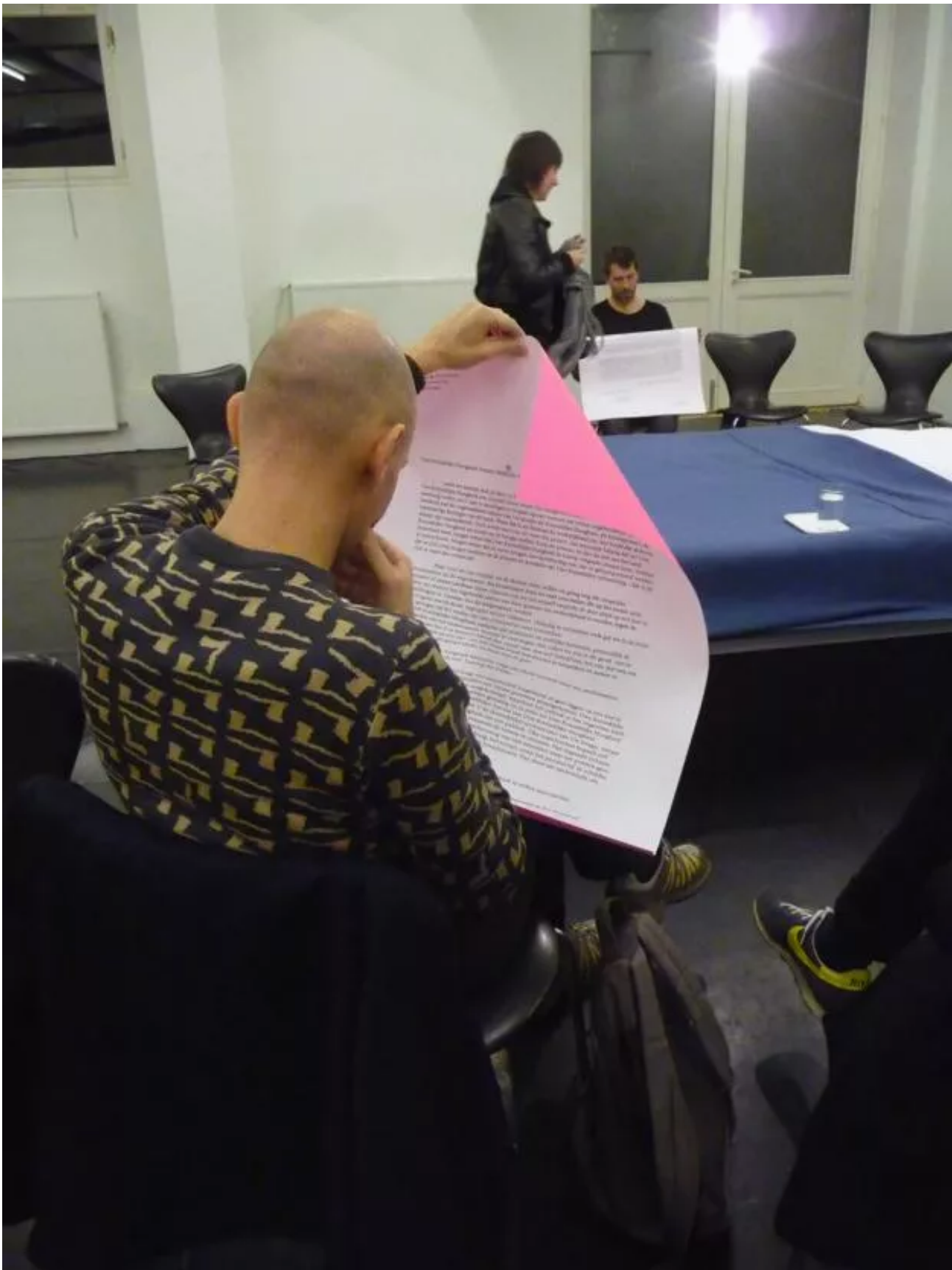

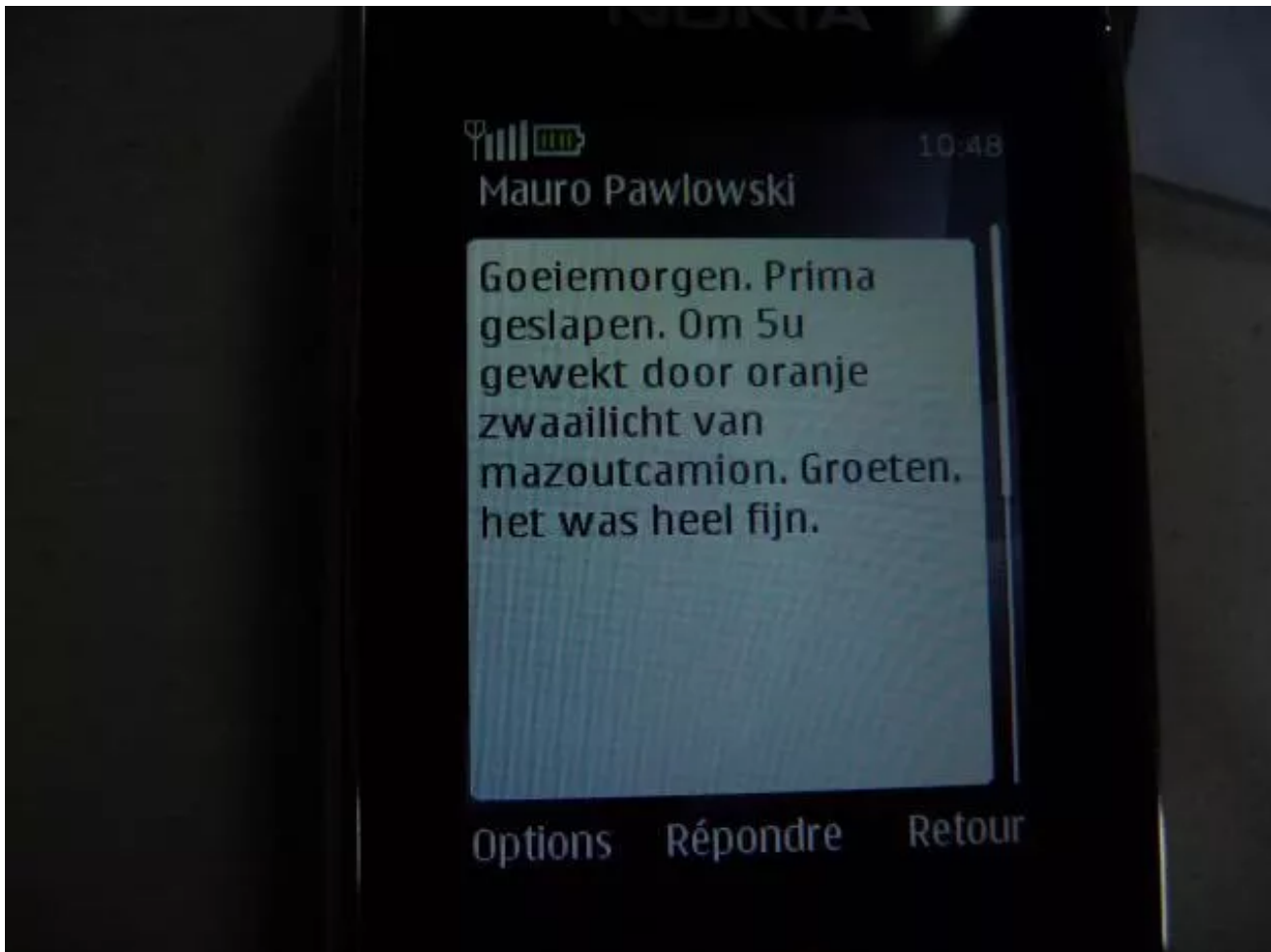

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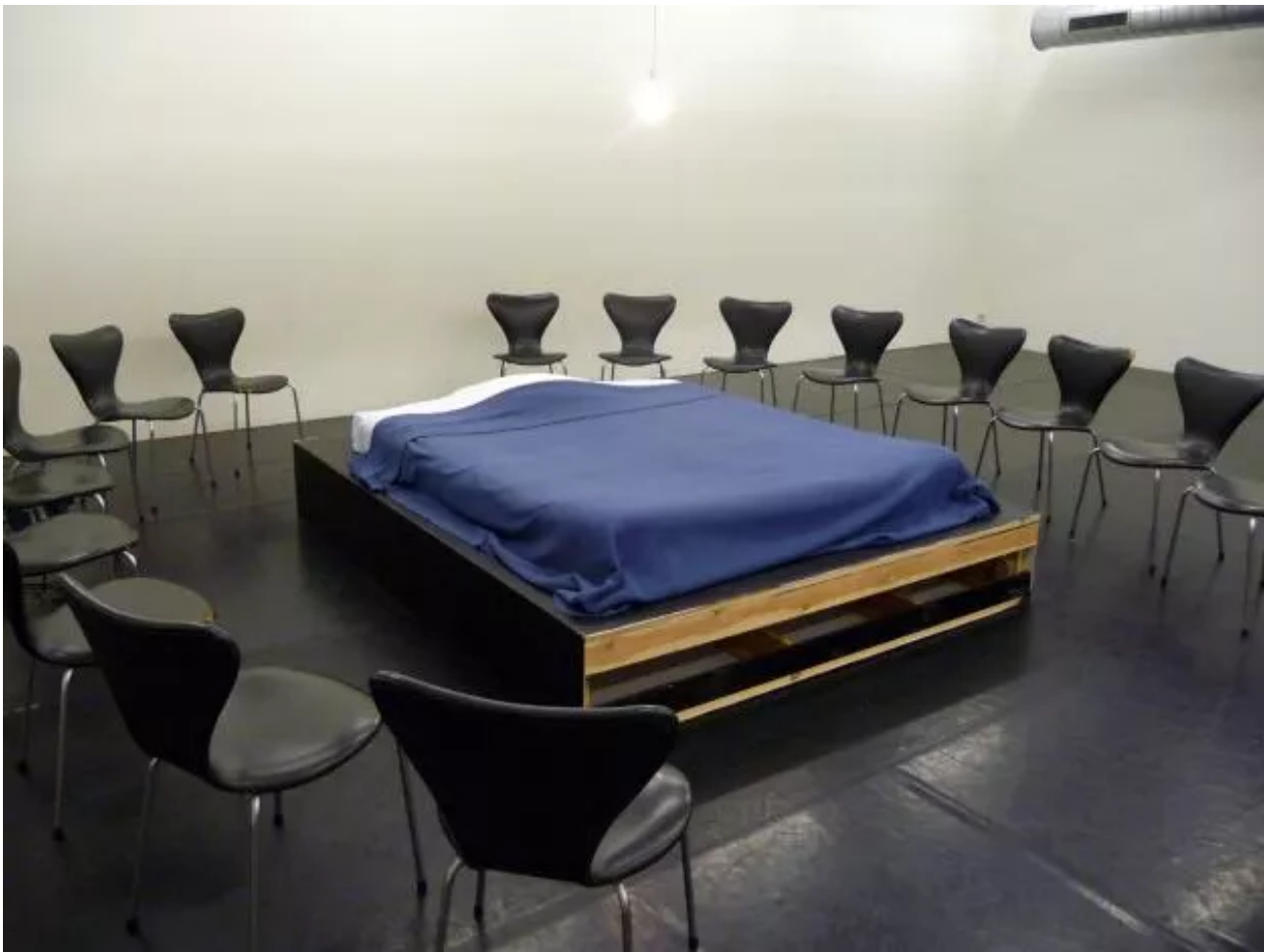
